What Is The Hudson Valley Art Association?

The Hudson Valley Art Association (HVAA) was founded in 1928 by artists of the Hudson Valley Region in the Studio of Jasper Cropsey (1823-1900), one of the most celebrated of the American landscape artists.

For many years the Association functioned as a local art society. Later it became regional – drawing exhibitors from the New England States, New York, New Jersey, Delaware, and Pennsylvania – growing in strength and importance until it is now a national non-profit organization.

No forms of distorted paintings are accepted by the Hudson Valley Art Association at their exhibitions as it is the aim of the Association to preserve and encourage the character, knowledge, craftsmanship and respect for natural form, color and design which distinguish fine painting and sculpture.

HVAA holds an annual exhibition of oils, aqua media, pastels, graphics and sculpture in the Exhibition Galleries of invitational associations. The show is open

to non-members as well as members. Awards totaling approximately \$17,000 are given for meritorious works.

All proceeds from entry fees are applied toward the cost of the exhibition. Any deficit is paid from membership dues. Many long hours are spent in preparation for a show that has gained a wide recognition for both artists and laymen.

To become a member, non-members must have been accepted into three shows, then voted on by the Board of Directors for approval. An invitation is then extended to the artist for membership. If you enjoy the Hudson Valley Art Association Exhibitions, it would be most heartening to learn of your approval. Of course, contributions to the support of the Association, or its Scholarship Fund, are most welcome.

She is best known for her contemporary realism work that explores themes around women, florals and her experiences from travels abroad. Sandra has received numerous awards and honors in international art exhibitions and competitions: Art Renewal Center, Oil Painters of America, Portrait Society of America and Salmagundi Club to name a few.

Sandra's love for travel has resulted in shows in both Italy and in the United States. She was invited to participate in the "Art of Giovanna Garzoni Exhibition" held in Florence's Pitti Palace with the collaboration of the Uffizi Galleries and the Medici Archive Project.

She initiated and directed Connecticut's first Atelier in 2009 in Wethersfield CT. Sandra Wakeen Atelier opened in 2014 in Somers CT, giving her the opportunity to humbly pass on to aspiring artist what she has learned over a forty year art career.

Sandra began her studies at Paier College of Art where she majored in illustration and won the prestigious Ken Davies Award. She was awarded entry and recognition into The Society of Illustrators NY in 1978 National Student Competition. Sandra later ventured into the world of fine art in 2007 pursing her studies in Europe, The Scottsdale Artists School with Betty Pat Gatlif forensic artist, and Lincoln Fox sculptor. David Leffel, Sherrie McGraw, Koo Schadler and Ron Boehmer were to become great influences in the refinement of Sandra's artistry.

Susan Wakeen's works are inspired by the emotions of people in everyday life. The individual expressions and realistic depictions of her portraits hold a timeless quality which she hopes will survive decades of observation.

Susan has received the highest National and International awards, honors, and recognitions by the industry's most prestigious art organizations. She was accepted into The National Sculpture Society's Annual Exhibitions, Art Renewal Center Salon Shows, Portrait Society of America's Annual Conferences, Salmagundi, Allied Artist, Academic Artist and more. She has received over forty-eight additional industry awards and honors.

Susan's career beginnings started with founding The Littlest Ballet Company LLC and The Susan Wakeen Doll Company Inc. in 1982 and 1985 respectively. She debuted her sculptures and dolls in New York City at the International Toy Fair where she was instantly recognized for her outstanding work and awarded "Doll of The Year" for her sculpture of Jeanne. She went on to become Senior Designer at Hasbro Toys in Pawtucket Rhode Island and contributed greatly to the growth of the doll design department.

Her lifelong passion for art compelled her back to sculpture. She furthered her studies with private instructors, Joshua Graham, and Dorothy Lepler. Susan continued

her training at The Scottsdale Artist School. Rosalind Cook and Betty-Pat Gatliff, the country's leading forensic facial reconstruction artist had an indelible effect on Susan!s concentration of the study of the portrait. Additionally she attended The Art Students League in NY to study with renowned portrait artist Max Ginsburg.

Her works can be found in galleries, museums, and private collections throughout the United States and Europe.

His watercolors have been exhibited in solo and group exhibitions in galleries and museums across the United States including the National Academy of Art and Design in New York; the Place St. Charles Gallery in New Orleans and the San Francisco Academy of Art in San Francisco.


Popadics is an advocate of watercolor and has dedicated his career to the advancement and appreciation of the medium. He is Vice-President and Treasurer of the prestigious American Watercolor Society in New York City and a Past-President of the New Jersey Water Color Society. He has also served on the board of the Ridgewood Art Institute in Ridgewood, NJ, where he currently teaches watercolor and drawing to adults and children. In addition, he leads outdoor painting workshops to various locations in the United States and Europe.

Joel Popadics was born in Passaic County, New Jersey in 1961. He received a BFA from the School of Visual Arts in New York. He presently resides in Wayne, NJ with his wife, Patricia and their two sons.

Andrew Lattimore was born in Yonkers, NY in 1956. As a professional artist for over 40 years, he has remained true to his endeavor, "the pursuit of truthful beauty in human creativity." Raised in New York, Andrew has been committed to the practice of fine art since the age of 12, when he began his artistic training. He studied anatomy with Steven Rogers Peck, who wrote the consummate book on anatomy, Atlas of Human Anatomy for the Artist. Once he completed his training at The National Academy of Fine Arts in New York, he spent three years in Europe which became the definitive influence in his professional life. He has been the recipient of many prestigious awards, such as; The Greenshields Foundation Grant, The Jane Peterson Award, The Edward Mooney Scholarship Award, The Albert Hall Garden Scholarship Award, and The ARC Salon Chairman's.

Throughout his artistic career, the human figure has remained his most inspiring subject."The challenge, the mechanics, and the rendering of the human form leaves no room for error," he says. He painted the official portrait of Governor George Pataki of New York and notable corporate executives, as well as prominent figures within the law and



Karen Worth was born in 1924. At the age of 9 she knew she wanted to be a sculptor but was inspired by all the arts. While in music and dance school, she invented a system of choreographic notation that is still being used today. She received her first scholarship at 15 from Carl Milles to the Cranbrook School.

She studied at the Settlement School in Philadelphia where she won the top award for an Architectural Competition. Member Albert Einstein wanted to meet her, and while holding her hands in his said "You're a genius!", she was just 16 at the time. At 17, Karen continued her study at Tyler Art School and the Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts.

During World War II she worked at the defense plant at the Philadelphia Navy Yard and enlisted in the Army Air Force serving as a specialist instructor of physical therapy and mental rehabilitation. In the evenings she worked in cartography and topography, creating with the disabled Veterans sculptured maps of the theaters of operation, ranging from North Africa to the Battle of the Bulge.

After taking time out to raise a family, Karen returned to sculpture in 1959, and was elected a Fellow of the National Sculpture Society in 1960. She designed her first medal for the Society of Medalists in 1963. Since that time she has created over 600 coins and medals from

She has been awarded the American Numismatic Society's Saltus Medal of Signal Achievement in the Art of the Medal, and

Karen served for 22 years as an EMT, and recently served three years as commander of the Jewish War Veteran's Post #756., using her time visiting hospitals and raising funds for disabled Veterans.

At 98, she maintains an active work schedule, continuing to create commissioned medals. She is a published photographer and poet and expressed the following.

"Into the future a human being advances in time and space: the fourth and fifth dimensions. The ballistic trajectory cause shock waves and tilted arcs, scientifically documented in cinematic studies of wind tunnels with rockets, missiles and airplanes. My design is in harmony with the laws of nature. The star is everyone's aspiration."
